LOG OF TOUR OF UNITED KINGDOM By CPO Edgar Wilson

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 20th-Most of us had to get up early for a haircut this morning. Tonight there is a farewell banquet at Charing Cross hotel, and we must be well polished up for it. Liberty till 1120, when we went to the Houses of Parliament. A member took us all through the buildings (giving us a history lesson at the same time.) After lunch we boarded a river boat and went down the Thames to the Royal Naval College at Greenwich. We were inspected by the Admiral Commanding, toured the College, and had tea. We stood at exactly 0 degrees longitude below the observatory. On returning to London, we cleaned up for the big "do", packed our gear, then left for the hotel.

HMCS Warrior had sent us all the cokes we could drink, and they made quite a hit with the English cadets, who had never tasted it before. Our skipper, Lt. Commander Moffat, presented the Navy League and the S.C.C. with a trophy for Interunit competition. The Hon. A. V. Alexander, Minister of Defense, gave us a very inspiring address. Afterwards we went by bus to Euston Station, where we met the Scouts, just back from France, and boarded the train for Glasgow.

THURSDAY, AUGUST 21st-We played cards and talked most of the night, but the Scouts, who were nearly exhausted, flaked out in the aisles or curled up on the seats. We arrived in Glasgow at 0930. After breakfast we had an hours leave. We arrived by train in Greenock at 1345. We went aboard Warrior at 1430, and spent the remainder of the day stowing our gear and sculling.

FRIDAY, AUGUST 22nd-Cook of the Mess today. The Old Man makes rounds tomorrow and everything must be well scrubbed. Hands fell in for leaving harbour at 1030. Being closed up, we cooks stayed below decks, so that when we slipped, at 1100, all I saw was a view just above the water line,

from a scuttle in the heads. Even this privilege was taken away when we got under way, and "Close Ship" was piped. I returned to my bucket and handscrubber.

We heard some scuttlebut that it was pretty

rough out on the pond. This made us more anxious than ever to get to "Slackers". By 2000 we were well out of sight of land. SATURDAY, AUGUST 23rd-Up at 0600 for P.T. on the Flight Deck. First period we had signals:

W.T. using yardarm lights and semaphore at the full length of the Flight Deck. Second period we went to the Air Briefing Room for a class in Damage Control, but the instructor didn't make it. Then we went to the chapel for a class in Naval Uniform. Again the instructor failed to show up. In the afternoon the ship's company had a Makers. Most of us slung our carts, still trying to catch up on our sleep-At night there was bingo and a show. The name of the movie was "Nobody Lives Forever", and as the ship was rolling quite a bit, half a dozen of the Scouts were beginning to realize how true that could be. The sea was entered in the Log as "Low Swell".

SUNDAY AUGUST 24th-When we were turned out this morning, our hammocks were swinging from one side to the other in slow time, and an icy wind was blowing down an open hatch. During the day all but four of the 32 Scouts were sick, and one or two of our party stayed in bed all day. The rest of us kept our minds off our stomachs by slinging our micks, reading and talking, but the sight of a dozen bodies, (Scouts, that is) lying on the weather deck under a sea boat was quite disheartening. There were no Divisions or Quarters.

MONDAY, AUGUST 25th-The sea seemed a little calmer today. We're taking it across the bows rather than the beam now, and it is'nt so bad. There was dense fog most of the day. We had signals first period, then types and parts of boats, in "B" hangar. During P.T. class we played badminton and ran relays- quite a feat when the deck keeps hitting

In the afternoon we had a lecture on "Purpose and Need of a Peacetime Navy". Last period the M.O. gave us a talk on Naval First Aid and Sick Bay work. At night we slung clean hammocks. It got rough again after dark, and the Flight Deck was "Out of Bounds". We add on an hour everyday, but instead of giving us more sleep, they change the clock at 1800, and make us wait an extra hour for

TUESDAY, AUGUST 26th-We were awake most of the night due to cargo breaking loose three or four times in "B" hangar, directly over our mess. We expected an aircraft engine to come through the deckhead at any moment. Every once in awhile the "Silent Hours" we shattered with a pipe for this party or that to repair or prevent damage. We were really rolling at 0600, but we still had to take P.T. First period we had signals in "A" hangar, then a gunnery class. Third period we had a class on jet propulsion. The ship's company had Make and Mend today instead of Wednesday, in the hopes that it will be better working weather then. We used the Makers to write a summary of the trip for the Skipper.
