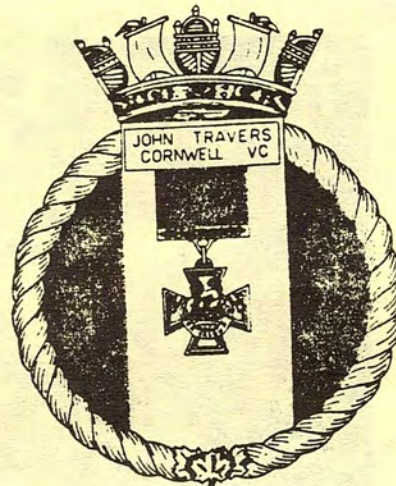
COXWAIN'S REPORT
