Commander Yates joined the Canadian Cadet Organization in Winnipeg, Manitoba with the Navy League Cadet Corps JRK MILLEN later enrolling in the Royal Canadian Sea Cadet Corps RAINBOW in Victoria, BC. In 1979, he enrolled as an officer in the Cadet Instructor Cadre and went on to serve with RCSCC FRASER in New Westminster, BC from 1981 to 1992, retiring from the corps following three years as Commanding Officer.

Commander Yates served with Pacific Region headquarters first as an instructor at the Regional Cadet Instructor School and then as the YAG Programme Co-ordinator in Vancouver. He was promoted to Lieutenant-Commander in 1986 and in 1988 he became the Pacific Region representative for the National Review of the Sea Cadet Mandatory Subjects of the Course Training Standards for local headquarters training.

During the summers of 1973 and 1975 to present, Commander Yates served in HMCS QUADRA as both a cadet and as a staff officer. He served in the Flotilla and became Flotilla Commander. In 1988 he assumed the duties of Training Officer followed in 1991 by an appointment as Executive Officer. He was promoted to Commanding Officer of HMCS QUADRA in January 1995 and promoted to his present rank in April of that year.

Commander Yates holds a diploma in Psychology for Social work. He resides in Colwood, BC with his wife, Vicky and their two children, David and James.





JOHN TRAVERS CORNWELL VC

At the height of the Battle of Jutland on 31 May 1916, **Boy** Seaman First Class John Travers Cornwell stood his station at his gun aboard HMS Chester. With his gun's crew dead and dying, the boy seaman, aged sixteen, remained at his most exposed post for orders which never arrived. It was here, he received his mortal wound. This act of bravery earned him the Victoria Cross, the Commonwealth's highest military honour. His action inspired a nation trapped in a war to end all wars.

CROSS was formed in 1920 first known as the Boy's Naval
Brigade and was known for many years as the Winnipeg Sea
Cadets. In the 1940's the name, JOHN TRAVERS
