MORE DIVISIONS FOSTER CLOSER CONTACTS

The purpose of the Divisional System is to promote corps spirit through effective communications and efficient administration. Several changes will take effect this September to further these goals.

Cadets of all ranks will be combined within each division. This will enable the Divisional Officers to administrate the Advisory Cadet System.

The number of divisions will also be increased to six. The divisions will be named

as follows:

- -Forecastle A ('fok-sel),
- -Forecastle B,
- -Maintop A,
- -Maintop B,
- -Band A, and
- -Band B.

In order to maintain a balanced parade state, sister divisions will combine to form single platoons on the deck. Forecastle A and Forecastle B will fall in as the first platoon. Maintop A and Maintop B will form the second platoon. Band A and Band B will form the Band.

Each division will have one Divisional Officer, although the parade state will not reflect this.

Divisional meetings will be held in classrooms each Thursday.

A Cock-of-the-Walk competition will be based on attendance, communications, and dress.

Our Divisional System, based on the trainee centred approach, will encourage each Cornwell cadet to contribute to our goals of citizenship and leadership. CQ

We returned home, more bronze that a VC, and found out that it had been raining in Winnipeg all weekend!




GOOSE SPIT. As your new Cox'n this year, I look forward to helping you with your training.
