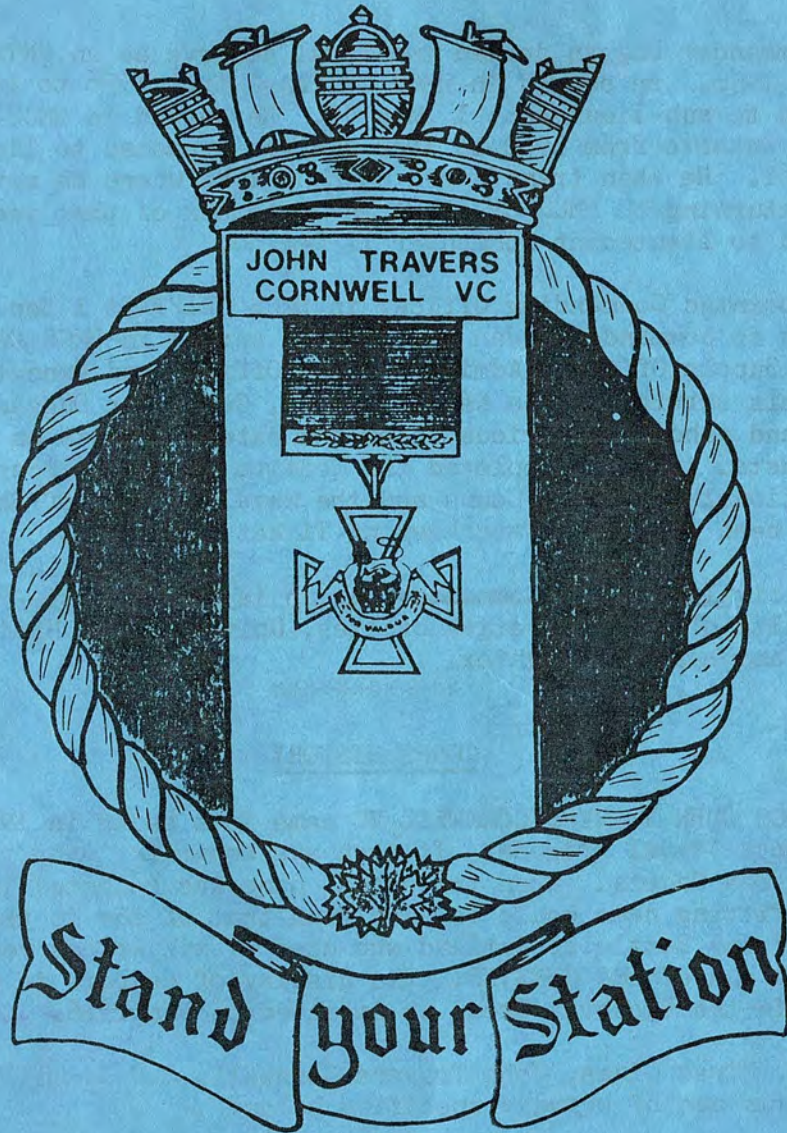

Commander Duggan joined the Naval Reserve as an UNTD Cadet in October 1956. He served in HMCS CHIPPAWA from 1956 to 1959 and was promoted to sub-lieutenant 1 July 59. He served in HMCS PREUOST, London, Ontario from 1960 to 1962 and was promoted to lieutenant 1 July 61. He then transferred to HMCS YORK where he served until 1966, returning to HMCS CHIPPAWA in September of that year. He was promoted to lieutenant commander 12 Dec 68.

Appointed Commanding Officer in HMCS CHIPPAWA 1 Sep 81, he was promoted to commander 1 Jan 82. He has served in HMCS CHIPPAWA as Reserve Supply Officer, Administration Officer and Executive Officer. During his service in the Naval Reserve, Commander Duggan has served afloat and ashore in various ships and establishments on the east and west coasts. He has completed the Reserve Supply Officer's Course, Instructional Technique Cours and the Naval Control of Shipping Course, and has been granted a Watchkeeping Ticket (Reserve).

In civilian life, Commander Duggan is an Associate Professor in the Faculty of Administrative Studies, University of Manitoba. He is married and has one daughter.

CORPS HISTORY

RCSCC JOHN TRAVERS CORNWELL VC came into being in 1920 first known as the Boys' Naval Brigade. It then was known for many years as the Winnipeg Sea Cadets. When the actual name was selected in the 1940's, no more fitting name could be used than that of the 16 year old boy seaman of the Battle of Jutland who died of his wounds received at his post on a gun of HMS CHESTER. His display of courage in his youth earned him the Victoria Cross as gazetted 15 Sep 1916.

Boy, First Class, John Travers Cornwell, O.N.J. 42563, for the conspicuous act of bravery specified below:

"Mortally wounded early in the action, Boy, First Class, John Travers Cornwell remained standing alone at a most exposed post, quietly awaiting orders, until the end of the action, with the gun's crew dead and wounded all around him. His age was under sixteen and a half years."
