Commander McInnes was born and educated in Winnipeg.

He started his career with the Navy League Cadets. In September of 1958 he joined RCSCC John Travers Cornwell VC. His term as a cadet ended in June of 1964 at the rank of Chief Petty Officer First Class.

In October of 1965 he was enrolled as an Acting Sub-Lieutenant in the Corps, promoted to Sub-Lieutenant in 1966 and appointed to the position of Training Officer in September of 1967. During the summer months, he completed a Divisional Officers course at HMCS Naden and served two summers as a Course Officer for the Boatswain Course at Esquimalt.

Leaving the Corps in the fall of 1969, he joined the Naval Reserve and undertook Officer Training while attending the University of Manitoba. In 1971 he returned to the cadet movement with a promotion to Lieutenant(N) and appointed Training Officer of RCSCC Qu'Appelle. In September of 1973 he was promoted to Lieutenant-Commander and returned to RCSCC John Travers Cornwell VC as Commanding Officer. While serving as Commanding Officer he was attached to the Deputy Chief of Staff Career Training Command Headquarters, Winnipeg to develop the Cadet Instructors List Officer Training Program. He relinquished command of the Corps in March 1976.

Upon the formation of Air Command in Winnipeg, he was transferred the the Headquarters and was appointed to the position of Staff Officer-Cadet Training. He was appointed as Commandant of the Regional Cadet Instructors School (Prairie) upon its formation in 1980 and moved to CFB Penhold in 1984 when the School relocated to Alberta. He was promoted to his present rank in April 1982.

As Commandant of the Regional Cadet Instructor School (Prairie) Commander McInnes is responsible for the Qualification Training of all CIL officers in Prairie Region.

JOHN TRAVERS CORNWELL VC

At the height of the Battle of Jutland on 31 May 1916, Boy Seaman First Class John Travers Cornwell stood his station at his gun aboard HMS Chester. With his gun's crew dead and dieing, the boy seaman, 16 years of age, remained at his most exposed post for orders that never came. It was here he received his mortal wound. It was this act of bravery that earned him the Victoria Cross, the Commonwealth's highest award.

His action inspired a nation trapped in a war to end all wars. Today, his action still inspires a sea cadet corps that proudly bears his name. Formed in 1920 as the Boy's Naval Brigade, the Royal Canadian Sea Cadet Corps JOHN TRAVERS CORNWELL VC has a proud history of dedicated service to the youth of our great country.
