



Officers as ordinary cadets. (answers on P. 18.)

There are 365 days per year available for work. There are 52 weeks a year in which you already have two days off per week, leaving 261 days available for work. Since you spend 16 hours each day away from work, you have used up 170 days leaving only 91 days available. You spend 30 minutes each day on coffee-break, that accounts for 23 days each year, leaving only 68 days available. With a one-hour lunch period each day, you have used up another 46 days, leaving only 22 days available for work. You normally spend 2 days per year on sick leave. This leaves you only 20 days available for work. You are off for 5 holidays per year, so your available working time is down to 15 days. We generously give you 14 days vacation per year which leaves only 1 day available for work and I'll be damned if you are going to take that day off:::

THE HISTORY OF JOHN TRAVERS CORNWELL

JOHN TRAVERS CORNWELL V.C.

JOHN TRAVERS CORNWELL WAS BORN ON 8TH JAN. 1900, AT LYDE COTTAGE, CLYDE PLACE, LEYTON, ESSEX, ENGLAND, THE SON OF ELI CORNWELL AND LILY KING-CORNWELL.

CORNWELL HAD ALWAYS BEEN KEEN TO JOIN THE NAVY, BUT HIS PARENTS REFUSED TO ALLOW HIM AT FIRST. WHEN HE LEFT SCHOOL HE BECAME A DELIVERY VAN BOY FOR BROOKE BOND & COMPANY. THE WAR PURSUADED HIS PARENTS, AND CORNWELL JOINED AT DAVENPORT ON 27TH JULY 1915, BECOMING BOY SECOND CLASS JOHN TRAVERS CORNWELL (OFFICIAL NO. J/42653). HE FOUND SEAMANSHIP FAIRLY EASY, BUT WHEN HE WENT TO HMS VIVID FOR GUNNERY TRAINING, THE GOING WAS MORE DIFFICULT. HE THEN TRANSFERED TO THE HMS CHESTER, A NEW LIGHT CRUISER, ON ITS COMMISSIONING DAY.

DURING WORLD WAR I, ON THE 31ST MAY 1916, AT 1740 HRS, IN THE NORTH SEA OFF JUTLAND, THE CHESTER FOUND HERSELF IN ACTION AGAINST FOUR GERMAN CRUISERS IN A BATTLE WHICH LATER BECAME KNOWN AS "THE BATTLE OF JUTLAND". CHESTER'S GUNS WERE NO MATCH FOR THE GUNS IN THE GERMAN CRUISERS AND SHE WAS HIT 17 TIMES WITHIN A FEW MINUTES.

AFTER THE SHOCK OF THE BATTLE, ONLY ONE FIGURE WAS STILL STANDING BY THE TURRET. HE WAS BOY FIRST CLASS JOHN TRAVERS CORNWELL, THE SIGHT-SETTER, WHO TOOK HIS ORDERS FROM FIRE CONTROL AND APPLIED THE NECESSARY RANGE CORRECTIONS TO THE GUN. HE WAS, LITERALLY, A BOY, NOT

SIGHT-SETTER, WHO TOOK HIS ORDERS FROM FIRE CONTROL AND APPLIED THE NECESSARY RANGE CORRECTIONS TO THE GUN. HE WAS, LITERALLY, A BOY, NOT YET 16 1/2 YEARS OLD, AND HE HAD ONLY BEEN IN THE NAVY FOR LESS THAN A YEAR. BUT THE SHORT MONTHS OF NAVAL DISCIPLINE TOLD. THOUGH HE WAS MORTALLY WOUNDED, CORNWELL REMAINED STANDING ALONE AT A MOST EXPOSED POST,QUIETLY AWAITING ORDERS, UNTIL THE END OF THE ACTION, WITH THE GUN'S CREW DEAD AND WOUNDED ALL AROUND HIM. CORNWELL LIVED LONG ENOUGH TO BE TAKEN ASHORE, BUT HE DIED OF HIS WOUNDS IN GRIMSBY HOSPITAL ON 2ND JUNE 1916. AFTER HIS DEATH HE WAS AWARDED THE VICTORIA CROSS FOR HIS IMPRESSIVE BEHAVIOUR IN THE BATTLE OF JUTLAND. BECAUSE OF HIS YOUTH, BOY CORNWELL RAPIDLY BECAME ONE OF THE MOST FAMOUS OF ALL VICTORIA CROSS WINNERS. HIS DEVOTION TO DUTY WAS AN EXAMPLE TO ALL OF US. THE WOUNDS WHICH RESULTED IN HIS DEATH WERE RECIEVED IN THE FIRST FEW MINUTES OF ACTION, YET HE REMAINED AT HIS MOST EXPOSED POST ON THE GUN, WAITING FOR ORDERS. HIS GUN WOULD NOT BEAR ON THE ENEMY, ALL BUT TWO OF THE TEN WERE KILLED OR WOUNDED, AND HE WAS THE ONLY ONE LEFT IN SUCH AN EXPOSED POSITION. BUT HE FELT HE MIGHT BE NEEDED, AND INDEED HE MIGHT HAVE BEEN, SO HE STAYED THERE, STANDING AND WAITING, UNDER HEAVY FIRE. STANDING AND WAITING, UNDER HEAVY FIRE.

THE BOY WHO DIED AT HIS POST OF DUTY, LEAVES US ALL THIS MESSAGE "OBEY YOUR ORDERS, CLING TO YOUR POST, DON'T GRUMBLE, STICK IT OUT".

When the cadets saw the 1972 Anniversary Yearbook, they were expecting this one to be 150 pages, hard cover, colored pictures, etc.






