

Reviewing Officer Lieutenant-Colonel Richard C. Hunt, CD

Lieutenant-colonel Richard Hunt is the corporate services manager for the Operations Branch within 1 Canadian Air Division/Canadian NORAD Region headquarters in Winnipeg. He assumed these responsibilities in July 1998.

Having grown up in Winnipeg, LCol Hunt began his military association as a sea cadet with the Royal Canadian Sea Cadet Corps John Travers Cornwell VC in 1967. While a sea cadet, LCol Hunt participated in the guard, gun's crew, band, range, communications, and scuba. He also took part in summer training at HMCS Quadra in Comox and CFB Esquimalt in Victoria. Upon reaching the maximum age for a sea cadet and holding the rank of Petty Officer First Class in the position of band drum major, LCol Hunt joined the Cadet Instructor List as an Officer Cadet. LCol Hunt continued to serve as an officer with the corps until his transfer to RCSCC Qu'Appelle as the training officer in 1976. In 1977, LCol Hunt was appointed commanding officer of RCSCC Qu'Appelle.

In 1980 LCol Hunt transferred from the Cadet Instructor List to the Air Reserve with the rank of Captain to assume full time duties as the personnel staff officer at Air Reserve Group Headquarters in Winnipeg. Promoted to rank of Major in 1984, LCol Hunt was appointed as school commandant of the newly created Air Reserve National Training Center in Borden. Following his appointment as school commandant, LCol Hunt held numerous staff positions at Air Reserve Group Headquarters, Air Command Headquarters and 1 Canadian Air Division/Canadian NORAD Region Headquarters including the positions of training resource management, senior staff officer operations and training, senior staff officer reserves, staff officer plans and requirements, management consultant, project manager, and administrative services manager. LCol Hunt was promoted to his current rank in 1993.

In addition to his staff responsibilities LCol Hunt has served as an aide-de-camp to the Lieutenant Governor of Manitoba and most recently served the past three years as President of the Cornwell (Winnipeg) Branch to the Navy League of Canada, for which he is founding member. LCol Hunt also operates his own management consulting business.

JOHN TRAVERS CORNWELL VICTORIA CROSS

At the height of the Battle of Jutland on 31 May 1916, Boy Seaman First Class John Travers Cornwell stood his station at his gun aboard HMS Chester. With his gun's crew dead and dying, the boy seaman, aged sixteen, remained at his most exposed post for orders which never arrived. It was here, he received his mortal would. This act of bravery earned him the Victoria Cross, the Commonwealth's highest military honour. His action inspired a nation trapped in a war to end all wars.

RCSCC JOHN TRAVERS CORNWELL VICTORIA CROSS was formed in 1920 first known as the Boy's Navel Brigade and was known for many years as the Winnipeg Sea Cadets. In the 1940's the name, JOHN TRAVERS CORNWELL VICTORIA CROSS was selected, and the corps continues a proud history of dedicated service to the youth of our great country.
