Lieutenant-Commander D.G. Bullee CD1 Out-Going Commanding Officer

Lieutenant-Commander Don Bullee was born and raised in Winnipeg, Manitoba. He joined RCSCC John Travers Cornwell VC in 1971. As a cadet Lieutenant-Commander Bullee participated in the Guard, Guns Crew and Range Team and spent summers training at HMCS Quadra as a course cadet and a staff cadet.

Lieutenant-Commander Bullee joined the officer cadre of John Travers Cornwell VC in 1977 and was commissioned in 1979. He held various positions in the corps including Guns Crew Officer, Guard Officer, Training Officer, Supply Officer and Executive Officer. Lieutenant-Commander Bullee was the Commanding Officer of John Travers Cornwell VC from 1990 to 1994. In May 1999 to present he again took Command of the Corps. He has had 32 years of unbroken service with RCSCC John Travers Cornwell VC. In 1989, he was presented his Canadian Decoration and in 1994, he was presented with the Navy League of Canada Distinguished Service Award.

Since 1980, Lieutenant-Commander Bullee has been employed as a police officer with the Winnipeg Police Service and is currently assigned as a Forensic Identification Specialist. In May 2000 he was presented the Police Exemplary Service Medal by the Lieutenant Governor of Manitoba. Lieutenant-Commander Bullee is married to his wife Susan and has two children.

Captain (N) D. Knight CD1 Reviewing Officer

Captain (N) Darren William Knight was born in Winnipeg, Manitoba. His first naval experience was as a member of RCSCC John Travers Cornwell VC for five years. He joined the Canadian Forces in 1978 under the Regular Officer Training Plan, attending first Royal Roads Military College in Victoria, and then the Royal Military College of Canada in Kingston. He graduated in 1982 with an Honours BA in Strategic Studies. Upon graduation, he took his commission as a naval officer.

Captain (N) Knight earned his bridge watchkeeping qualification aboard Canadian warships in 1984, at which time he was also accepted into the Canadian Forces Intelligence Branch. Since 1984 he has served in intelligence positions at National Defence Headquarters in Ottawa and at Maritime Command Headquarters in Halifax. During the 1991 Persian Gulf War, he served as the Joint Staff Intelligence Officer (J2) at Headquarters, Canadian Forces Middle East, and was awarded the Chief of Defence Staff Commendation for his work. Captain (N) Knight graduated from the Canadian Forces Command and Staff College in 1993, and then served as the Senior Staff Officer Intelligence at Headquarters, Maritime Forces Atlantic, in Halifax. Upon promotion to the rank of Commander in October 1994, he also assumed the duties of Deputy Chief of Staff Intelligence for the Canadian Navy. In April 1998, Captain (N) Knight was appointed Commanding Officer of the newly established Joint Ocean Surveillance and Information Centre, known as "TRINITY".

In July of 1999, he was appointed to the position of Canadian Forces Intelligence Liaison Officer in Washington. In August 2001, he was promoted to his current rank and assumed new duties at National Defence Headquarters in Ottawa, where he is currently the Director of Joint Force Capabilities.



Lieutenant (N) S. Chadwick In-Coming Commanding Officer

Lieutenant (N) Chadwick was born in Winnipeg in 1967. She joined RCSCC John Travers Cornwell VC in 1982. As a cadet, Lieutenant (N) Chadwick participated in the Guard, Drill Team and First Aid training and spent summers training at HMCS QUADRA as course cadet and as a staff cadet.

Lieutenant (N) Chadwick joined the officer cadre of JOHN TRAVERS CORNWELL VC in 1986 and was commissioned in 1987. She held various positions in the corps including Guard Officer and Admin Officer. Summers were spent on the shores of Lake Winnipeg, as Administration Officer at HMCS GIMLI. In 1990, her career with Transport Canada necessitated leaving the corps and Winnipeg for a number of northern postings, including a two-year sojourn as the Admin Officer for 889 RCACS La Ronge and a posting to Resolute Bay, NWT. Returning to Winnipeg in 1996, Lieutenant (N) Chadwick rejoined the corps as the Training Officer and later as Executive Officer. In 1997 she assisted in the formation of RCSCC Dawson, and was awarded the Canadian Forces Certificate of Appreciation for services rendered to the Cadet Movement.

Lieutenant (N) Chadwick is a Flight Service Specialist with Nav Canada. She is pursuing a degree in History at the University of Manitoba, and is an active member of St. Andrew's Anglican Church.

JOHN TRAVERS CORNWELL VC

At the height of the Battle of Jutland, on 31 May 1916, **Boy Seaman First Class John Travers Cornwell** stood his station at his gun aboard the **HMS Chester**. With his gun's crew dead and dying, the boy seaman, aged sixteen, remained at his most exposed post for orders which never arrived. It was here he received his mortal wound. This act of bravery earned him the Victoria Cross, the Commonwealth's highest military honour. His action inspired a nation trapped in a war to end all wars.

Royal Canadian Sea Cadet Corps JOHN TRAVERS CORNWELL VICTORIA CROSS was formed in 1920, first known as the Boy's Naval Brigade, and was known for many years as the Winnipeg Sea Cadets. In the 1940's the name **JOHN TRAVERS CORNWELL VICTORIA CROSS** was selected and the corps continues a proud history of dedicated service to the youth of our great country.

The Annual Ceremonial Parade is a culmination of a year's hard work. Through Annual Ceremonial Parade 2003, the cadets and officers show a respect for history and a commitment to the future of this proud corps. This year the parade is combined with a Change of Command Ceremony.
