

Boy Seaman 1st Class John Travers Cornwell VC



CORNWELL, JOHN TRAVERS, Boy, First Class, Royal Navy, was born on 8 Jan. 1900, at Leyton, son of Eli and Alice Cornwell. He was educated at Walton Road School, Manor Park. He wished to be a sailor when he left school, but his parents could not bear the thought of losing him so soon so he bravely turned to the work that lay to his hand, and became a boy on a Brook Bond's tea van. He was also a keen Boy Scout, and held two certificates. When the European War broke out his father promptly joined the Army, and Jack Cornwell was given his chance to join the Navy. He went through preliminary training at Devonport from 27 July, 1915 and became a First Class Boy on HMS Chester for active service in Admiral Beatty's North Sea Squadron. A few months after Jack Cornwell joined his ship, Admiral Beatty came to grips with the German High Seas Fleet near Jutland 31st May 1916; he was mortally wounded in action, and died two days later in Grimsby hospital. He was posthumously awarded the Victoria Cross [London Gazette, 15 Sept. 1916]: " John Travers Cornwell, Boy (First Class), O.N. J.42563: Mortally wounded early in the action, Boy, First Class, John Travers Cornwell remained standing alone at a most exposed post, quietly awaiting orders, until the end of the action, with the gun's crew dead and wounded around him. His age was under sixteen and half years."

Brigadier-General Thuen was born in 1956 in Tisdale, Saskatchewan. Upon graduation from Rose Valley High School in 1974, he joined the Canadian Forces under the Regular Officer Training Plan. He attended both Royal Roads Military College in Victoria and Royal Military College in Kingston, graduating in 1978, with a Bachelor of Arts degree in History and English. He then attended the Basic Air Navigation Course, at Canadian Forces Air Navigation School (CFANS) in Winnipeg, which he successfully completed in April of 1979. He was subsequently posted to 407 Squadron in Comox, British Columbia, where he flew as a navigator and navigatorcommunicator on the Argus and Aurora. He was transferred to CFANS as an instructor in 1982, where he became an A1 Category Navigation Instructor and the Chief Officer Development Instructor. In 1985, he was selected as Executive Assistant to Chief of Staff Support at Air Command Headquarters.

In 1987, then Captain Thuen, was selected for a posting with the North American Air Defence (NORAD) Airborne Warning and Control (AWACS) program at Tinker Air Force Base, Oklahoma City. During his tenure in Oklahoma he achieved an "Exceptionally Qualified" instructor category and was promoted to major. He also received the Deputy Commander-in-Chief NORAD

Le Brigadier-général Thuen est né en 1956, à Tisdale, en Saskatchewan. En 1974, après avoir obtenu son diplôme de l'école secondaire Rose Valley, il s'enrôle dans les Forces canadiennes, dans le cadre du Programme de formation des officiers de la Force régulière. Il étudie au Royal Roads Military College, à Victoria, et au Collège militaire royal, à Kingston, où il obtient son baccalauréat ès art en histoire et en anglais, en 1978. Il suit ensuite le cours élémentaire de navigation à l'École de navigation aérienne des Forces canadiennes (ENAFC), à Winnipeg où il obtient son diplôme en avril 1979. Il est alors affecté au 407^e Escadron, à Comox, en Colombie-Britannique, où il est navigateur et navigateur-communicateur à bord de l'Argus et de l'Aurora. En 1982, il est transféré à l'ENAFC où il devient instructeur de navigation, de catégorie A1, et instructeur en chef chargé du perfectionnement des officiers. En 1985, il est nommé chef de cabinet du chef d'état-major chargé du soutien au quartier général du Commandement aérien.

En 1987, capitaine, il est affecté au programme du système aéroporté d'alerte et de contrôle (AWACS), au commandement de la Défense aérospatiale de l'Amérique du Nord (NORAD), à la base aérienne Tinker d'Oklahoma City. Pendant cette affectation, il obtient la catégorie d'instructeur « Qualification exceptionnelle » et

Commendation for his outstanding support to the Canadian Component and to NORAD.

He returned to AIRCOM HQ, in 1991, as Staff Officer Personnel Relations and Acting Senior Staff Officer Personnel. In 1994 he attended Staff College in Toronto and was subsequently posted to 435 Squadron in Winnipeg. He served as the Navigator Leader and Aircrew Leader until his retirement from the Regular Force on 1 April 1997.

Major Thuen joined the Primary Reserve immediately and served as 17 Wing Heritage Officer and 17 Wing Air Reserve Flight Commander. He was promoted to Lieutenant-Colonel in January 1999 and was transferred to the position of A1 Reserve Coordinator for Training Wings. He then moved to 1 Canadian Air Division Headquarters as A1 Reserve Coordinator responsible for Reserve Establishments and Policy and subsequently as A1 Reserve Personnel responsible for Air Reserve policy development and implementation. Thuen was then promoted to Colonel on 15 August 2001. Upon promotion, he attended the Advanced Military Studies course (AMSC) at the Canadian Forces College in Following completion of the Toronto. AMSC, he took up the post of A1 Reserve at 1 Canadian Air Division Headquarters in Winnipeg. In May 2004, he assumed the duties of A3 Aviation, Patrol and Transport Readiness.

BGen Thuen was promoted to his current rank on 26 May 2006 and assumed the duties of Deputy Commander Mission Support at 1 Canadian Air Division in Winnipeg. In addition, he has been appointed Director General Air Reserve.

BGen Thuen and his wife, Barbara, are the proud parents of two daughters Danielle and Karen (Lucas) who also reside in Winnipeg.

il est promu major. Par ailleurs, il reçoit une mention élogieuse de l'adjoint au commandant en chef du NORAD, pour le soutien remarquable qu'il apporte à l'élément canadien et au NORAD. En 1991, il revient au QG C Air à titre d'Officier d'état-major - Relations avec le personnel et d'Officier supérieur d'état-major-Personnel, par intérim. En 1994, il étudie au Collège d'état-major à Toronto et est ensuite affecté au 435 Esc, à Winnipeg. Il y est chef des navigateurs et chef du personnel navigant jusqu'à son départ en retraite, le 1^{er} avril 1997.

Le Major Thuen s'engage immédiatement dans la Première réserve et devient officier du patrimoine à la 17^e Escadre et commandant de l'Escadrille de la Réserve aérienne de la 17e Escadre. Il est promu lieutenant-colonel en janvier 1999 et est transféré au poste d'A1 Coordination de la Réserve pour les escadres d'instruction. Il devient ensuite A1 Coordination de la Réserve, chargé des effectifs et des politiques de la Réserve au quartier général de la 1^{re} Division aérienne du Canada, puis A1 Personnel de la Réserve, chargé de l'élaboration et de la mise en œuvre de la politique de la Réserve aérienne. Il est promu colonel, le 15 août 2001, puis il suit le Cours supérieur des études militaires (CSEM) au Collège des Forces canadiennes à Toronto. Il est ensuite nommé au poste d'A1 Réserve au quartier général de la 1^{re} Division aérienne du Canada, à Winnipeg. En mai 2004, il remplit les fonctions d'A3 Disponibilité opérationnelle - Transport, patrouille et aviation.

Promu brigadier-général le 26 mai 2006, il est commandant adjoint du soutien des missions à la 1^{re} Division aérienne du Canada, à Winnipeg. Il est également Directeur général - Réserve aérienne.

Le Brigadier-général Thuen et sa femme, Barbara, ont deux filles, Danielle et Karen (Lucas) qui vivent aussi à Winnipeg.
