Boy Seaman 1st Class John Travers Cornwell VC 1900 - 1916



CORNWELL, JOHN TRAVERS, Boy, First Class, Royal Navy, was born on 8 Jan. 1900, at Leyton, the son of Eli and Alice Cornwell. He was educated at Walton Road School, Manor Park. He wished to be a sailor when he left school, but his parents could not bear the thought of losing him so soon so he bravely turned to the work that lay to his hand, and became a boy on a Brook Bond's tea van. Jack was also a keen Boy Scout, and held two certificates. When the European War broke out his father promptly joined the Army, and Jack Cornwell was given his chance to join the Navy. He went through preliminary training at Devonport from 27 July, 1915 and became a First Class Boy on HMS Chester for active service in Admiral Beatty's North Sea Squadron. A few months after Jack Cornwell joined his ship, Admiral Beatty came to grips with the German High Seas Fleet near Jutland 31st May 1916. Jack Cornwell was mortally wounded in action, and died two days later in Grimsby hospital. He was posthumously awarded the Victoria Cross.

From the <u>London Gazette</u>, 15 Sept. 1916: "John Travers Cornwell, Boy (First Class), O.N. J.42563: Mortally wounded early in the action, Boy, First Class, John Travers Cornwell remained standing alone at a most exposed post, quietly awaiting orders, until the end of the action, with the

Biography of

Lieutenant-Commander W. P. Stiff CD

Lieutenant-Commander William Paul Stiff started his naval career in Kitimat, British Columbia in 1968 with the Royal Canadian Sea Cadets. After a couple of years of riding a motorcycle around western Canada and of working in the Alberta oil patch, he joined the Navy as a MARS officer in Edmonton in 1977.

Basic and initial classification training on the West coast followed over the next two years. Two postings to the Destroyer Escort HMCS RESTIGOUCHE came next where he earned his Bridge watch keeping certificate and certificate of competency. In RESTIGOUCHE he sailed a good part of the Pacific and has fond memories of many port visits to Pearl Harbor and San Diego and especially of the Far East. These were the days of the Cold War and not without interaction with Soviet spy ships, submarines and aircraft to keep things interesting.

A posting to the minesweeper squadron followed and he served as Navigating Officer in THUNDER and FUNDY. These were wonderful days of training young officers on an open bridge in the scenic waters of the Gulf Islands. Salmon fishing in Hakai Pass and dodging BC ferries was part of the deal too. Following his trick in the sweepers he spent two years as a Course Training Officer at VENTURE, the Naval Officer's Training Centre in Esquimalt.

From VENTURE he was selected for the Combat Control Officer's Course in Halifax. 12 gruelling months of classroom, weapons trainer and ops room simulation training later he was posted as Weapons Officer to the Destroyer HURON. Here he spent a hectic year or so sailing both sides of the Atlantic before taking HURON through the Panama Canal and up the west coast to her new home in Esquimalt. Then it was right back to the East Coast and a tour as combat officer of HMCS SAGUENAY.

The HALIFAX class frigate project was in full swing then and LCdr Stiff was posted to the project detachment in Montreal to train the initial crews on the new combat systems. It was in Montreal too that he met and married Jayne, the love of his life. In 1990 he was posted to the year-long French course in Valcartier followed by postings to NAVRESHQ and to Fleet School Quebec as its first Commandant.

In 1993 his life changed forever with the arrival of the twins, Jim and Clayton originally referred to as "double trouble," and in 1995 the family, now seven in number, moved to Winnipeg first to instruct at the Canadian Forces School of Aerospace Studies, and then to command the Language Training Centre and the Canadian Forces Recruiting Centre. Like all come-from-aways, his first thoughts were of blizzards and mosquitos, but soon enough Manitoba became home.

LCdr Stiff came to CHIPPAWA in 2005 when still a member of the Regular Force and served as Training Officer. He transferred to the primary reserve in 2008 and assumed command in 2011. LCdr Stiff retired from the primary reserve in 2015 after 5 years in command of CHIPPAWA and joined the staff of the Regional Cadet Support Unit Northwest where he now serves part-time.
